Rehoboth Beach Ocean Outfall Project

Message from City Manager Sharon Lynn

Thank you for your continued patience as we work to complete an unprecedented amount of construction for the ocean outfall project. Thanks for putting up with the noise, mess, and inconvenience that goes along with construction. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers permit had a condition of approval, which limits in-water work from April 1 through September 30 in any year. The actual permit deadline for completion of all work is December 31, 2020. The weather has been a considerable challenge during this project and affected offshore work. The contractor completed a majority of the in-water work prior to April 1, 2018. However, there were some in-water work days that occurred after April 1, 2018. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has modified the permit to allow for in-water work to be performed after April 1, 2018. A permit modification has also been approved by the Department of Natural Resources & Environmental Control – Division of Water for the Subaqueous Lands Permit. The permit had a Time of Year Restriction (TOYR), allowing the contractor to work from October 15 through March 31, 2018. The permit modification amended the TOYR for in-water work to be performed between October 15 through May 23, 2018. This modification required additional conditions including a marine mammal observer to be present for all in-water work performed beyond the March 31 deadline. In addition to a marine mammal observer, the contractor performed turbidity and seawater temperature monitoring and reporting daily. The

focus of this project has always been the importance of the consent decree, first and foremost, to comply with the federal and state mandates of June 1, 2018, to have an operating ocean outfall. Although May 23, 2018, was anticipated as a project completion date, most paving and restoration work will extend beyond that date. The Commissioners approved a change order May 1, 2018, to authorize a modification to the paving on Henlopen Avenue at an additional cost of \$310,000. Presently, Henlopen Avenue has very little supporting material under the existing pavement other than sand. The approved change order for the entire street entails a layer of 3 ½ inches of support fill material and then a layer of 2 inches of top paving. This is a very important change order for creating a much stronger foundation for Henlopen Avenue. This will allow for a way of arresting the deterioration and extending the street's life. Paving and restoration have been underway on State Road. Once State Road is completed, the crew is anticipated to move to Henlopen Avenue the week of May 21 and expect completion the week of June 11. Following Henlopen Avenue, Canal Street work will begin. All work is weather dependent. Our focus is on finishing this project as safely and quickly as possible. 

Rehoboth Beach Volunteer Fire Co. Adds New Equipment

The Rehoboth Beach Volunteer Fire Company has increased its EMS capabilities by adding two new pieces of life-saving equipment. The equipment added is the Lucas Chest Compression Devices. The Lucas Chest Compression System is designed to help improve outcomes of sudden cardiac arrest victims and improve operations for medical responders. The Lucas Chest Compression System is a safe and efficient tool that standardizes chest compressions in accordance with the latest scientific guidelines. It provides the same quality for all patients, independent of transport conditions, rescuer fatigue, or variability in the experience level of the caregiver. By doing this, it frees up rescuers to focus on other life-saving tasks and creates new rescue opportunities. The addition of these Lucas Devices would not have been possible without the funding provided by the City of Rehoboth Beach. We are in the process of trying to obtain the funding for a third Lucas Device for one of our other ambulances. The cost of the devices is \$14,000 each. We sincerely thank the City of Rehoboth Beach for the funding to purchase these devices.

In addition to the Lucas Devices, the fire company also took delivery of a new fire truck. The new piece was built by Pierce Fire Apparatus. It is an Engine Pumper, and the equipment number is Engine 86-3. It carries 1,000 gallons of water, 40 gallons of firefighting foam and has a 2,000 gpm pump. Also, it has all the necessary tools and hose for firefighting operations. It replaces a 38-year-old Mack Engine.

The Rehoboth Firefighters look forward to many years of great service from this engine.

The Rehoboth Beach Volunteer Fire Company has a superb career staff, and a very dedicated group of volunteer firefighters who provide fire, rescue, EMS and fire prevention services. As in all volunteer organizations, there is always a need for more folks to help out. While we could always use additional volunteer firefighters, we also need help with fundraising, fire prevention, and other operations. If you know anyone who might be interested in being a volunteer firefighter or helping with other parts of our operation, please contact us at rehobothbeachfire.com. We make a difference in our community. You could too! The Rehoboth Beach Volunteer Fire Company responded to over 4,300 calls for service last year and has been providing emergency services to the City of Rehoboth Beach and the surrounding area for over 100 years. We are proud of that fact and look forward to serving this community for many years to come.

In 2018, the Rehoboth Beach Police Department remains dedicated to its primary mission that without compromise for crime and through the relentless pursuit of criminals, we will safeguard the lives and property of the people we serve, reduce the incidence and fear of crime, and enhance public safety while working with our diverse community to improve their quality of life.

In 2017, officers of the Rehoboth Beach Police Department responded to 3,719 calls

for service. Officers conducted 431 misdemeanor and 52 felony investigations. These investigations concluded with the prosecution of 246 misdemeanor and 104 felony arrests. While on patrol officers made 2,530 traffic arrests and apprehended 83 intoxicated motorists, preventing numerous traffic accidents that could have led to possible injury or even death. Officers handled a total of 188 traffic collision investigations, 14 of which were personal injury related accidents. Officers conducted over 10,272 hours of foot patrol throughout the city leading to the completion of 25,453 business and 4,044 residential property checks during which officers checked the exterior security of buildings in an effort to prevent property crime.

The Rehoboth Beach Police Department would like to congratulate Sgt. Benjamin Mitchell on his recent retirement. Sgt. Mitchell served with the department since 1988 and during his last 17 years served as a shift commander managing the daily operations of one of four patrol shifts. The department is eternally grateful for Sgt. Mitchell's long-standing dedication to public safety and wishes him well in his future endeavors.

The police department will supplement its force during the upcoming summer months with the addition of 24 seasonal police officers who began training in early April. These officers, most of whom are college students aspiring to a full-time position in law enforcement, are a tremendous asset to the police department as they act in their primary function as liaisons between the department and the community. The seasonal officers will be utilized in a foot and bicycle patrol capacity throughout the city, frequently placing them in direct contact with our community. While granted full enforcement powers, the seasonal officers routinely act in an informative capacity, educating community members and visitors to our city of our local ordinances working towards our goals of cooperation and compliance. The department asks that if you have any issues or need help, do not hesitate to contact any of our full-time or seasonal police officers.

It is with pride that the Rehoboth Beach Police Department can announce that it is currently housed in its new state-of-the-art police station located within the new building. The new building provides department members with modern detention facilities, evidence detection and storage facilities, patrol quarters, training facilities, locker rooms, and a new 911 center. The new police facilities serve as an integral tool to help our agency enhance public safety.

Stay Informed

Keep Our Waterways Clean

Follow the tips below to stop small, individual activities that cause pollution and result in large-scale pollution.



10 Things You Can Do to Prevent Stormwater Runoff Pollution:

1. Remember: Only rain belongs in the drain! Don't dump anything down storm drains. Be sure to clear away leaves and debris.
2. Clean up pet waste. Bag up pet waste and dispose of it in the trash to prevent harmful bacteria from washing into local waterways.
3. Keep your car well-maintained. Fix any fluid leaks promptly and make sure to clean-up any spills.
4. Wash your car at a commercial car wash rather than in the street or in your driveway. If you wash your car at home, wash it on your lawn.
5. Direct downspouts away from paved surfaces; consider planting a rain garden or installing a rain barrel to collect the storm water.
6. Cut down on fertilizers, pesticides and herbicides. If you use these chemicals, follow directions and use them sparingly. Don't fertilize before a rainstorm.
7. Reduce impervious surfaces at home and increase the vegetated land cover of your property. Use bricks, gravel, cobbles, natural stone, or permeable pavers instead of asphalt or concrete when possible.
8. Do not drain your pool or hot tub to a storm drain. Allow chlorine to dissipate for several days and test the water to ensure the residual chlorine is zero before slowly draining to a landscaped area.
9. Walk, bike, or share a ride when possible. Driving causes particulates to enter our air. Air pollution can contaminate rain and end up in our rivers and streams.
10. Share your knowledge with your friends, colleagues and neighbors!

Building & Licensing Department

Do you need a building permit, or have questions about new construction or rental properties? The Building & Licensing Department can help. We are dedicated to protecting the quality of life, health, safety and welfare of the residents of the City of Rehoboth Beach through the enforcement of codes, ordinances and regulations.

Building permits are required for any and all work that improves the condition, value or longevity of a structure. This includes additions, alterations or renovations. Examples include: replacing a roof, windows, drywall or siding; the removal and/or replacement of any component of the structure; covering any portion of the yard with concrete, stone, seashells or asphalt; the construction of any structure which includes anything having a permanent location on the ground, including hot tubs, decks, steps, fences and driveways.

Repairs are excluded from this requirement. Repairs refer to any action taken to maintain an existing component of the structure, using the existing component and allowing only minimal replacement of parts of the component with new parts or the existing parts. Examples of repair and maintenance includes cleaning gutters, replacing the flush mechanism in a water closet, re-attaching shingles and flashing after a storm, touch-up painting or the seasonal installation of screens or storm windows.

Plumbing Permits are required for the following work:

- The addition or relocation of any plumbing fixture.
- The removal and/or replacement of any portion of the water or sewer line connecting a privately owned structure to the city's water or sewer lines.
- Installation of a lawn irrigation system.
- Permits are also required for demolition work and tree work.

Building & Licensing Department Location

The Building & Licensing Department is located on the second floor of City Hall. As summer approaches, the Building & Licensing Department is urging homeowners and renters to take the time to check indoor and outdoor areas for potential safety hazards. Proper inspections undertaken now can help to keep your family and friends safe in the future.

Contractor License Requirements

All contractors and subcontractors must obtain a business license to perform work within the City of Rehoboth Beach. All contractors applying for a new license or to renew their existing license will be required to submit a current copy of their State of Delaware Contractor's License and proof of liability insurance and/or bonding, listing the City of Rehoboth Beach as an additional insured.

Is Your House Number Readable?

Most fire departments have detailed maps of the neighborhoods they protect and are familiar with the locations of streets, commercial buildings and hydrants within their jurisdiction.

Because emergency response crews need to find addresses as quickly as possible when called, they often rely on house numbers for quick reference. **If the numbers on your home are not easy to**

find or read, it will take longer for crews to reach you. Victims of heart attack, stroke, or choking need immediate care. **Minutes can mean the difference between life and death.**

The law requires house numbers be posted conspicuously and readily recognizable from the street. Numbers on the house must be at least 4" high and displayed with contrast to the background and they must be reflective. Residents may also enhance visibility by having the house number located near an outside light at their front door.

Take a moment today to look at your house number. Make sure your numbers follow the above guidelines. It will help emergency crews find you easier and faster.



Register for CodeRED

The City of Rehoboth Beach uses CodeRED to send EMERGENCY notifications by phone, email, text and social media to keep citizens informed of emergencies such as evacuation notices, utility outages, water main breaks, fire or floods, chemical spills, or other emergency situations.



Election 2018

Annual municipal elections are held on the second Saturday in August, this year on August 11, 2018, from 10:00 a.m. – 6:00 p.m. at City Hall, 229 Rehoboth Avenue. The voter registration deadline is now 30 days

prior to the date of the annual election.

You can vote by absentee ballot. An affidavit must be completed. Affidavits may be downloaded at cityofrehoboth.com or by calling City Hall at 302-227-6181 to request an affidavit be mailed to you.

Absentee ballots will be available forty-five (45) days prior to the Annual Municipal Election. Ballots will be sent to everyone who has an affidavit on file. The deadline for the city to mail ballots is the last Tuesday prior to the election. Ballots **MUST** be received by mail or in person before the polls close on the day of the election.

Spring Residential Tree Check



As the temperature warms up and leaves start to unfurl, it's an opportune time to assess any needs your trees may have. The first thing to do is look up! Most people notice a weed in the flowerbed but miss a dead limb 40 feet above their heads. At a minimum, check for any dead or broken branches in the canopy. Also, look for branches that are near your home or hang low over walkways. If there are issues, or if you're not sure, contact a certified arborist. Most arborists offer free consultations and can point out existing or potential issues. If there are large or valuable trees on your property, an arborist should visit on a regular basis to monitor them.

Parking, Permits, Meters and more

Parking Permit Season

Effective from the Friday before Memorial Day through Labor Day.

Parking permits are required daily from 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. in all non-metered areas within the city but are not valid for metered spaces.

Parking permits are available for sale at the following locations:

- Parking Department, 1 City Hall Drive
- Rehoboth Avenue coming into town after crossing the drawbridge
- Bayard Avenue coming into town after crossing over Silver Lake
- Chamber of Commerce Visitors Center, 501 Rehoboth Avenue

Parking Permit Fees

- Seasonal Transferable – \$250.00 (After August 1 – \$125.00)
- Seasonal Non-Transferable – \$225.00 (After August 1 – \$115.00)
- Weekly – \$80.00
- Three Day Weekend – \$45.00
- Weekend Daily – \$20.00
- Weekday Daily – \$15.00
- Seasonal transferable parking permits, weekend daily and weekday daily permits, include parking at Deauville Beach

Parking meters are in effect from:

- The Friday immediately preceding Memorial Day through the second Sunday following Labor Day, from 10:00 a.m. until 12:00 a.m. (midnight).
- Meter rates are \$2.00 per hour, payable by quarters, by credit card, or via Parkmobile or call 877-727-5758. Please note that not all methods are available at all locations.
- All 30 minute parking spaces are \$1.00 per 1/2 hour during the metered season. The time limit for these spaces is enforced year round.

Bicycle rules

For a safe and enjoyable ride bicycles are allowed on the Boardwalk between the hours of 5:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. from May 15 to September 15. Bicycles are not permitted on the Bandstand throughout the entire year.

Adults are prohibited from riding bicycles on the sidewalks at all times. Children under 12 years of age may not ride on the

sidewalks of Rehoboth Avenue or First Street between Virginia and Brooklyn Avenues. Bicyclists must obey all traffic laws and ride on the right-hand side of the roadway in single file. Proper lights and reflectors are required on bicycles at night.

Beach wheelchairs will be available

The beach wheelchair program is operated under the supervision of the Rehoboth Beach Patrol. Please contact the Beach Wheelchair Supervisor at Beach Patrol Headquarters, 1 Baltimore Avenue, or at the storage sheds located on the beach at Maryland Avenue and Laurel Street, to accommodate your needs.

Beach wheelchairs must remain within two blocks of the pick-up location and may not be used on the boardwalk. Wheelchairs are provided on a first come, first served basis. You will need to provide your name and cell phone number when checking out a beach wheelchair. For more information please call Rehoboth Beach Patrol at 302-227-2280.

All Scooters must...

have a permit to park on city streets and in city parking lots according to the following:

Friday before Memorial Day through Labor Day, 7 days a week, 24 hours a day, except if paying at a parking meter.

Scooter permits are...

- \$40 for the season
- Available only from the Parking Department located at 1 City Hall Drive

Scooter permits must be affixed to the front of scooters, preferably on one of the forks.

Wherever possible the rear wheel should be placed against the curb.

New safety and beach experience rules

do not allow grills, fires, cooking/heating devices, canopies, tents or other fixtures.

Umbrellas with a circular shade no greater than 8' in diameter and a central pole no greater than 7'6" in height are permitted. Baby tents up to 36" high x 36" wide x 36" deep, to shade infants and small children are permitted. City permits for temporary exceptions can be requested for weddings and special events.
